## **<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>**

### **1.1 INTRODUCTION**

Incepted as a Sanskrit Vidyalaya in 1856 by His Highness, Raja Randhir Singh, the visionary ruler of Kapurthala, Nawab Jassa Singh Ahluwalia Govt. College has entered 167th year of its establishment. It was in the same year in which three universities in Calcutta, Madras and Bombay were established under the new education policy based on Woods' Dispatch of 1854. The students used to sit under a Peepal tree where a havan kund was erected and the tutees were imparted education in the traditional Guru-Shishya Parampara. This 200 year old Peepal tree still adorns the college campus. Beginning as a high school, it was affiliated to Calcutta University till 1882. In 1896 the school was raised to the level of an intermediate arts and subsequently to degree college in 1945. The college went co-educational in 1943, arguably the first institute to do so in the region with only 12 girl students. Taking a giant leap the college became a Post Graduate Institution in 1976 by introducing M.A. English. At present, the college has post graduation in Economics, English and Commerce. In 1978 the college was given its present name Nawab Jassa Singh Ahluwalia college after the founder of the quondam Kapurthala state. It was the first college in Punjab to tutor pupils in foreign language. Maharaja Jagatjit Singh loved French so he introduced the teaching of French in 1916 and this college became the sole institution teaching French in the region. To absorb the escalating number of the tutees, a new U-shaped building was erected around the Peepal tree which was inaugurated by Sir Louis Dane, the then Lieutenant Governor of Punjab on April 7, 1913. It has the honor of being a premiere seat of learning in undivided Punjab and is the oldest surviving educational institute in North India. Set up on a sprawling 33 acres campus with covered area of 74 08.17 square meters, the magnificent red and white building bears the royal insignia comprising 32 class rooms, 8 well-equipped laboratories and 2 Conference Halls. The learning spaces are airy and well-lit encompassing 18 ICT enabled smart classrooms and a seminar hall. It is well connected with railway station and bus stand at just 1.7 km and 1.2 km respectively. The magnificent and aesthetically designed building of the college comprises four blocks: U Block, New Block, Commerce Block and Science Block and is the best for facilitating the teaching-learning process.

#### Vision

To perpetuate the philosophy of equipping and imparting quality education and skills to the students from varied socio-economic, regional and linguistic backgrounds. To disseminate quality education to the galvanized and responsible citizens who act as stimulants through affordable value education along with the monetary perks provided by government of Punjab exceptionally for the weaker segments of society, providing egalitarian platforms, connecting students to the realities of the world they live in, while infusing conventional with modern and professionalism with humanism. Academic brilliance is nurtured by adopting a radical, student centric teaching- learning pedagogy following a diligent curricular. Having transversed a journey that has crossed sesquicentennial milestone too, the institution envisions to stay distinctive and noticeable as an icon of preserved cultural heritage, that includes tangible culture as well, which indeed is kind of protection of indigenous intellectual property.

- Dearth of permanent teaching staff really hampers the institutional growth. Lack of sufficient, qualified teachers and staff instability threaten students' ability to learn and reduce teachers' effectiveness. The teacher shortage makes it more difficult to build a solid reputation for teaching and to professionalize it.
- More concentration on teaching and learning has led to a constrained scope for research rigor on the campus.
- Paucity of vocational and skill based courses exists although institution has introduce skill based diploma and certificate courses in the recent two years.
- No student exchange program at national and international levels.
- Constrained collateral to augment digital teaching learning on campus.
- Diminishing interest in pure sciences.
- Lesser autonomy in curriculum designing.
- Institute interaction with the industry is limited because of limited accessibility which prevents the rural youth to grab opportunities.
- Though the present infrastructure of the library is sufficient to cater to the needs of the ongoing programs, but college requires e- subscriptions and filling of post of a librarian and a restorer.
- Established research and innovation cell is not functional in the college because of lack of research infrastructure thus students lag behind for developing entrepreneurial skills.
- Hostel accommodation facilities is not present in the institute.

### **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

Our Institution, a co-educational Government college, affiliated to Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar, invariably endeavours to attain accomplishment in providing globally combative quality education. The curriculum provided by the university is strictly adhered to. The college follows the academic calendar released each year by Guru Nanak Dev University .Admissions, commencement of classes, internal assessments and examinations are scheduled as per this calendar. Given college's emphasis on co- curricular and extension activities, each department and society also create their calendar of events. These calendars pertain to activities such as guests lectures, academic meets, field trips and skill development workshops. The principal encourages adherence to these calendars through regular meetings with the staff. The faculty members are also appointed as Members of Board of studies, to proffer recommendations for the formulation and revision of the curriculum.

Academic process in the institution is streamlined with timetables lesson plans, workloads and other administrative tasks prepared well in advance of teaching sessions. The teaching faculty of the institution is supported by the well-equipped ICT enabled smart classrooms with internet facility. The faculty regularly update their disciplinary knowledge through active involvement in faculty development programmes, refresher Courses, curriculum reviews, evaluation and participating in different decision making bodies.

Teaching strategies as lecture method, project work, presentations etc. are blended with life experiences through field trips, ensure effective delivery of curriculum that incorporates an emphatic approach and makes teaching learner-centric. Some courses provided practical experience to student through internship, training and projects and field trips and industrial visits add an experiential quotient to students' understanding. Complementing these proceeds are strong Mentor-Mentee and Buddy Groups. These groups have been formed wherein a small number of students are placed under one staff member who develops a meaningful relationship with them. The main thrust of these groups is to help the students sail through difficulties and enrich themselves through their career paths. Mentors help to boost morale, monitor students twice a week and record their progress. They provide a confidential atmosphere where students can explore any topic or situation and discuss any concern that they have. Motivational sessions are conducted to encourage the students to participate in activities as per their comfort and interests. Issues of anxiety, stress and a slew of academic worries are resolved through collaborative efforts of the mentor and mentee and buddy groups.

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The institution works fastidiously to ameliorate pedagogic procedures focusing on holistic development of students. Lucid student centric teaching pedagogies ignite passion for learning amongst the students of diverse background and culture with varying abilities. The college adheres to a broad spectrum of programmes and courses available for the students according to their needs and choices.

Right from admission, the college follows a well-administered and transparent procedure with ease of availability of information on our website. The fee structure is nominal, so students from diverse background especially from rural areas take advantage of low fee structure. With outcome based education the conduction

of co-curricular activities and community outreach programs remote holistic development of the students.

The institution has formative and summative assessment system for measuring the learning outcomes of learners. Class tests are conducted regularly along with academic and extension activities in diverse fields and mid semester exams for learner's over growth; the slow learners and advance learners are identified through robust and transparent internal evaluation process. The performance of slow learner has enhanced by addressing their challenges through effective counselling with necessary monitoring and remedial classes. The advanced learners are encouraged towards self-learning with an access to e-learning platforms along with the guidance to participate in reputed competitive exams.

Special attention is given to the students with special needs from economically weaker sections. All the students are encouraged to participate inter college competitions to optimize their potential. The robust evaluation process is not only the parameter to access the integrity of the teaching learning process. There is also a strong feedback system in place which is critically analyzed and addressed to ensure equality enhancement. The institution supports faculty to participate in workshops, conferences and seminars to update their knowledge and teaching skills along with promising future prospects.

The institution maintains complete transparency in evaluation methods and examination related grievances. Anti-ragging and harassments cells of the institution, ensures a safe environment for the learners and tutorial and buddy groups promote individual focus on the students. Along with these human values and professional ethics are imparted in the young brains through extension activities and experiential learning. The learners are also engaged in various clubs, societies and cells such as PTA, IQAC etc. as student representatives and their suggestions are paid due attention in all policy matters, has resulted in sequential milestones leading the institute towards realization of its vision.

#### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

The college recognizes the importance of research in academic pursuits. Persistent efforts are made to inculcate the interest of both the faculty as well as the students in research based activities and the college has a welldefined policy for the promotion of the same. The institution is established with a vision to benefit the global community using its strength in research, innovation and extension activities. This being key areas of focus, the institute is committed for promoting interdisciplinary research, innovation skills and development to create novel technologies through academic collaborations. During last 5 years the college's Ph. D qualified faculty has been engaged in various projects and they have a number of publications under their credit. There have been publications in the form of books, journals, and paper presentations etc. in the subjects of Commerce, History, Punjabi, and Science. Institution has created an ecosystem for innovation and has taken initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge. For this motive a survey was conducted and the roof of physics theatre was found to be the most suitable for installation of Solar panels, due to good solar insolation. After completing all the essentials, a system with 1.25Kw capacity was installed which resulted in the reduction in electricity bills of the college. Rain water harvesting system is there to conserve and replenish water under the earth and also to check flooding during the rainy season. Extension activities are organized by various societies and departments in the college of National Cadet Corps (NCC), National Service Scheme(NSS), Red Cross Society, Red Ribbon Club, Career Counselling & Guidance Cell, departmental societies etc. During last five years a number of Extension activities have been conducted in the college campus, nearby localities, city and villages and have earned appreciation for the volunteers, brought a positive change in the area concerned and sensitized the students deeply. Awareness campaigns under 'Atam Nirbhar Bharat', 'Fit India Movement', 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan', Van Mahotsav, Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat, Road Safety Month, Blood Donation Camp, Mission Pride of Punjab, Awareness against Drug Addiction, World Environment Day etc. are organized by NCC and NSS successfully, which nurture desirable attributes of social responsibility among the students. Apart from these field trips, departmental competitions like Quiz, Poster Making, Essay Writing, Debates, Paper Presentation and Inter College Competitions are organised to strengthen experimental & task based learning.

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The magnificent and aesthetically designed building of the college comprises four blocks: U Block, New Block, Commerce Block and Science Block and is the best for facilitating the teaching-learning process. The exemplary infrastructure comprises 32 class rooms, 8 well equipped laboratories and two conference halls with 18 ICT enabled smart classrooms and a seminar hall which are airy and spacious along with Botanical Garden, Ground, OSA Park and other small parks inside the college premises. There is a separate girls' common room equipped with all necessary facilities. There are 32 CCTV cameras to ensure vigilance and personal safety of students, teachers and other stakeholders. The college has a well established Information and Communication Technology enabled network, which forms the backbone of campus teaching-learning, research, administration and governance. Wi-Fi facility along with 78 computers, 7 printers cum scanners and 3 scanners are available in the campus. The college library, the biggest treasure of knowledge has one of the oldest book banks. It is well equipped with AC reading room for students and more than 37,000 books. It is a rich repertoire of learning resources. The college makes great efforts to provide the latest technology and challenging competitive material to the students and keeps them well acquainted with current and latest knowledge of the world. The college also takes pride in its comprehensive sports and fitness infrastructure. The outdoor sports facilities include a basketball ground, a cricket pitch and open space for yoga and athletics. Indoor arrangement includes a fully equipped gymnasium with state- of -the-art exercise machines. The college canteen is well equipped and fullymaintained.Regular hygienic checks are conducted in the kitchen to ensure a qualitatively satisfactory food experience for the students. The college has received various grants from government agencies for upgradation and maintenance of infrastructure. A new conference hall has been constructed under RUSA and HE-scheme. The building has full back-up power supply in form of UPS and generator. There are noticeboards at relevant spots in order to cater the need of passing information about admission, examinations, inter-office notices, departmental activities notices etc. Under IQAC, college has appointed committee for infrastructure involving senior staff and student members. Inside the college premises ramp provides an easy access to differently abled students. The learning resources of the institute are well-maintained and the faculty makes full use of ICT tools. For the effective maintenance and safety of the campus, the institute has an active maintenance committee that ensures upkeep of all the facilities with a system of periodic check.

#### **Student Support and Progression**

Through student-centric financial incentives and welfare measures N.J.S.A Govt. College has created a fabric of social inclusion and empowerment. Various capacity building and skill enhancement initiatives are undertaken for the benefit of students. The institution provides both centre as well as state government scholarships to needy and meritorious students. Some departments of the college also provide student the funds to support marginalized students in continuation of education and to reduce the dropout rate. During the last five years, there has been a drastic decrease in the number of college dropouts as many students have benefited from this funding support.In addition to financial support, the Grievance Redressal Cell of the college helps the students to seek redressal for complaints, including harassment and ragging. Formal Counselling is also provided to the students for their emotional wellbeing. Career Counselling & Guidance Cell provides support with regard to career aspirations, guidance for higher education, civil services exams, workshops and seminars

to acquaint the students with various career options. Student representatives are included as editors in College Magazine and in Student Council to give them opportunities to have say in college matters. Various capacity building and skill development seminars, workshops and lectures are organized to aid the students in their overall growth. Extension activities foster the hidden talent and empower the students to become proactive lifelong learners. Activities and awareness campaigns by NCC & NSS wings of the institution impart learning and sensitize the students towards societal and environmental issues. The departmental activities and competitions aid in their progression, to make them ready for the real world experience. An Honesty Shop was opened in the college on 11.07.2018 in the library, where stationery items were kept at the corner of the library with rate list without CCTV, and students can pick any item by dropping price money in a box. This initiative taken by college was successful. The College also facilitates students' representation and engagement in various administrative and co- curricular activities. The students regularly participate in various cultural and sports competitions at district, state and national level and bring laurels to their alma mater. Our students secure meritorious positions in the university. The Alumni Association OSA meets annually and supports the institution financially, and with its valuable feedback and works for the betterment of the students.

#### Governance, Leadership and Management

The college has a transparent and multi layered governance marked by transparency, inclusivity and accountability. The governance at the institution is reflective of a visionary and effective leadership. With well defined vision and mission, the college bolsters an atmosphere promotive to actualize intellectually proficient, morally conscientious and socially committed citizens. The vision and mission statements stand as the future timelines of the institution. The dynamic and able leadership at the institute has imbibed these statements and incorporates them in formulating the strategic perspective plan of the institution. The Participative management of the college believes in decentralized leadership at every level of administration and a robust structure has been established to sustain and improve the quality of education. The main policy framing body of the institute comprises Principal as the Chairman and senior staff members. They review the plan for the growth and expansion of the institution and this report of the progress, approval of annual budget and expenditure are encompassed by the Governing Council. The Principal is the driving force behind the academic and administrative activities of the institution. Vice Principal and Heads of respective departments take collective responsibility in planning all the academic events and in decision making. Various sub committees like Scholarship, Career Counselling, Time Table, IQAC, PTA, OSA etc. are formed at the beginning of every academic year. They meet to plan, accomplish and evaluate the academic, curricular activities and disciplinary measures to ensure continuous improvement of academic standards. Minutes of the meetings of all the committees are maintained. The Staff Council and various committees & cells in the college deal with different areas such as Admission Rules, Conducting of Examination, Extension Activities, Scholarship provisions, Use of financial grants from various spheres, Youth and women empowerment endeavors and many other similar areas. The institute also has well-structured Performance Based Appraisal System to ensure productivity of the faculty. Accordingly each employee is expected to fill an Annual Performance Appraisal Report (APAR) and submit it to the concerned authority. The College conducts internal and external financial audits on a regular basis. The Compliance of academic procedures and continuous improvements in teaching learning process is ensured through systematic audits by IQAC.

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

Environmental degradation has become a critical and global concern over the past two decades. Among these concerns the college has embraced green initiative as an area that is distinct to the institution's priorities. The

vision and the mission of college also emphasise the need to teach young minds about the principles of human rights, equality and social Justice. The college has adopted two Best Practices: Environmental Sustainability and Education Inclusion. Massive endeavors have been made by the students and the academia to create awareness about environmental sustainability. At present the college flaunts 1022 plant species as its fauna. This has improved the biodiversity index of the campus by attracting many species of birds and insects. This novel initiative amalgamates the tradition by selecting species native to the region and modern Miyawaki technique thereby promoting natural restoration of land. The college tries to minimise the use of chemical fertilisers and encourages the plantation of trees that are indigenous, hardy and replenish water and nutrition in the soil. It is developing into hub of natural diversity and is helping to reduce the carbon footprint of the region. It has also ameliorated the biodiversity marker of the area by attracting many species of birds and insects. NJSA upholds the value of educational equity. This refers to the achievement of fairness justice and impartiality in imparting education .Equity in this context also means the ability to meet the specific needs of specific individuals by fostering inclusive class rooms. The goal is to provide learning environment where social and economic disadvantages do not pose barriers to learning, development and growth. Our institution tries to develop effective education practices that would lead to transformation change for student learning and achievements. The focus is to develop effective verbal, non-verbal, written, technological and communication skills to support and enhance student learning. Being government institution, it primarily caters to the needs of students from socially and economically backward sections of society. The aim of the practice is to enhance their learning capabilities so that they are better placed in the society.

	Science are taught in first four semesters of the course. Projects on community engagement and social service are undertaken by students every semester. For example, Distribution of necessary accessories to Kushta Ashram and slum areas, blood donation camps, educating women on health and hygiene etc. NSS Volunteers and NCC Cadets take part in community services throughout the year. The faculty of the Institute participate in many interdisciplinary National and International Conferences, Seminars, Orientations, Faculty Development, Programmes etc. every year to promote a blending of different disciplines leading to the exchange of research ideas and knowledge on topics of various domains.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is a virtual/digital storehouse that contains the information of the credits earned by individual students throughout their learning journey. It will enable students to open their accounts and provide multiple options for entering and leaving colleges or universities. ABC IDs of college students were created in the month of January 2023 by the orders of DPI (Colleges). Under the directions of GNDU and approval by the Higher Education Department, Punjab, ABC IDs are being created for the students taking admissions in the session 2023-2024. Here, it is to be specially mentioned that only GNDU is following the guidelines provided by DPI (Colleges), Punjab, for the newly admitted students to have ABC IDs. As our Institute is affiliated with GNDU Amritsar, any student who takes admission at our College has their ABC IDs created by the College itself. Furthermore, the Institute is offering a basket of elective papers for each B.A., B.Sc., M.A. English, and Economics courses, and the students have the flexibility to choose the subjects as per their requirements. This is a preliminary initiative taken by the Institute to fulfill the bigger goal of implementing the Academic Bank of Credits.
3. Skill development:	The institution organizes various events and programs to foster a sense of teamwork, inventiveness, inquisitiveness, reliability, assertiveness, and sympathy in faculty and students. All of this lays a strong foundation for future academic and career success. The faculty of the institution participate in various FDPs and seminars

to upgrade their knowledge and develop the skills necessary to perform effectively. The college has taken the initiative to conduct seminars, workshops, and guest lectures to sensitize the students and develop their leadership qualities, communication skills, creativity, professionalism, and more. Students and teachers alike are encouraged to upscale their skills. This academic year, the students have visited various industries to have firsthand knowledge and experience of working, and they have attended extension lectures by renowned personalities, which gave them insight to choose their careers wisely. The institution's skill development efforts are evident through its enrichment of curriculum, electives, and add-on courses too. During the year 2021-22, four Certificate Courses and two Diploma courses recognized by Jagat Guru Nanak Punjab State Open University, Patiala, have been taken. During this period, 42 students were enrolled in the Certificate Course of Accounting and Taxation, 3 students in the Certificate Course for Fashion Designing, 5 students in the Certificate Course for GST, and 17 students in the Certificate Course for Software Development. Meanwhile, 15 students were enrolled in the Diploma for Fashion Designing and 9 students in the Diploma for Software Development. In the current academic year 2022-23, two Diploma courses are being taught in Fashion Designing and Software Development with 15 and 9 students respectively. The soft skill development program is an integral part of every student's curriculum. Besides English Learning and Teaching Skills, Poetry Recitation, Essay writing competitions, and Literary competitions help enhance their learning. For PG Degree Courses like M.A. English, M.A. Economics, and M.Com, the students have many options to choose their careers, such as Teacher, Receptionist, IELTS Trainer, Field Manager, Computer Operator, Banking, etc. 4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge Language, as a medium of communication, is the system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using driving force of worldly affairs. Without language one cannot think of the existence of the world itself. Study of Indian Languages in the present times is extremely vital. It is the need of the hour as the

exploration of Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS) has begun. We have started to explore the ancient indigenous knowledge of various scientific fields which are naturally in indigenous languages. So, to

Hence, the study of Indian Languages contributes to the greater cause of unearthing the ancient Indian knowledge and converging its outcomes with the modern requirements leading to prosperity of the society and nation at large. Study of indigenous languages not only leads to the prosperity of the nation but also makes the individual person culturally rooted and betters his/her Expressiveness. To promote/ integrate Indian Knowledge System, College is ever conscious. College has included Hindi, English, Punjabi and Sanskrit in its curriculum as Elective Subjects to reach across cultures and religions, thereby promoting true National Spirit in the youth. National and International days related to language like Mother Tongue Day, Hindi Diwas, World Poetry Day etc. are celebrated to promote these languages. The rich literature of these languages inculcates ethical values and rich heritage of our country. In Post Graduate course in English includes a paper Indian Writing in Translation which have four different units of different languages that is Sanskrit, Punjabi, Bengali and Marathi. These learners get to know about different cultures through literature. In the curriculum set by Guru Nanak Dev University thee are religious topics too like Japji Sahib Gurbani by Shri Guru Nanak Dev Ji in Post Graduate English, which indicates the zeal of the Institution to inculcate spiritual, moral and ethical values in the students- that seem diminishing in today's world. Inclusion of 'Nath Bani', 'Bhagat Bani' and 'Gurbani' in Elective Punjabi Syllabus, incorporation of sermons by Shri Guru Nanak Dev Ji, Kabir ji, Surdas ji and Tulsi Das ji in Elective Hindi Syllabus and inculcation of moral and spiritual values from some chapters of Bhagvat gita in Elective Sanskrit syllabus unfold the richness of ancient scriptures for the students. 5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Outcome-based education (OBE) offers a framework to learn and deliver the acquired skills, focusing on the end result. It increases students' academic success

ICT helps students get ready by letting them explore, assess, share, and present information in a fairly organized way. Modern learners are good with technology, so using ICT in their everyday learning makes them feel and look good. Students are encouraged to learn without going to physical classes by using mobile apps like PPT, videos, value-added courses, skill development courses, etc. Using ICT to teach and learn is part of the education system today. ICT- based education helps improve and use information delivery in the best way possible. Some of the classrooms have LCD screens and Wi-Fi, which makes it easy for teachers to upload their lessons and materials and encourages them to do so. This helps online classes and learning go smoothly. At the institution, two skill-oriented diploma courses are being taught, recognized by Jagat Guru Nanak Punjab State Open University, Patiala. Technology also gives us great opportunities to make learning easier

By doing this, they can learn how to make presentations, study for school and job exams, and distinguish between reliable and unreliable sources on the internet. ### **Response:**

The curricula transacted are determined at the level of the University. The college draws up **Academic Schedule** for each session in line with the Calendar laid out by the university, which comprises information regarding admission, working days, academic terms and dates of filing of reservations and returns. It is assimilated in the prospectus uploaded on the college website.

- The principal encourages adherence to these calendars through regular meetings with the staff.
- Departmental meetings are conducted at the onset of each semester and **Workload Allocation** is done as per the subject specialisation and perspicacity of faculty. Department wise **Time table** is framed keeping in view the subject combination offered by the college and is arrayed both on the notice board as well as shared online via college website and Student Portal.
- The tutorial periods play a critical role in enhancing students' performance in **Assignments** .Teachers thus ensure that tutorials take place as per schedule during which they provide students the tips on how to attempt good assignments

Further faculty members inform the students about the expectations from the assignments and the criteria they would use to grade. - Teachers remain very mindful of evaluating assignments in a timely manner. Students are provided feedback on their performance.
- In order to make teaching- learning process more learner centric, different teaching strategies like lecture method, project work presentations, case studies, seminars and study tools are adopted. **Mentor Mentee Groups** and **Buddy Groups** have been created for individual interaction between the faculty and the students.
- Registrar Academics conducts internal Academic Audit of all departments to ensure effectual delivery of curriculum..
- Unitised Teaching Plans are followed for efficacious curriculum delivery.
- The students are appraised for internal assessment on marks scored in MSTs, Attendance and participation in the class activities.
- Teachers remain very mindful of evaluating assignments in a timely manner. Students are

provided feedback on their performance and also offered opportunities to improve their scores if they wish.

### **Response:**

- Professional Ethics are addressed in a large number of courses as well. Discussions on ancient texts and their lessons for today's work life encourage students to imbibe values such as honesty, integrity and courage. The course 'Busines Ethics and Corporate Governance' and 'Business and

Social Ethics' educate students about both business ethics and corporate excellence.

- The college has walked an extra mile in its pursuit to imbibe environmental consciousness by creating Botanical Garden. Botanical garden is rich in plant biodiversity. The students learn about the various types of plant varieties like medicinal plants, ornamental plants, herbs, shrubs while enjoying the beauty of botanical garden. In the botanical garden mostly those plants are planted which are required for the botany practicals as taxonomy is mentioned in the syllabus of B.Sc. Medical. It is a collection of trees bearing different canopies, shrubs, herbs and succulents.
- At present the college flaunts 1022 plant species as its fauna. This has improved the biodiversity index of the campus by attracting many species of birds and insects. This novel initiative amalgamates the tradition by selecting species native to the region and modern Miyawaki technique thereby promoting natural restoration of land. The college tries to minimise the use of chemical fertilisers and encourages the Plantation of trees that are indigenous, hardy and replenish water and nutrition in the soil. It is developing into hub of natural diversity and is helping to reduce the carbon footprint of the region. It has also ameliorated the biodiversity marker of the area by attracting many species of birds and insects. The students learn to appreciate their natural habitats. The college boasts of its 200 years old veteran peepal tree which is a landmark and heritage Tree. Many tree plantation drives are conducted on a regular basis and students are exhorted to conserve water and adopt at least three plants and nurture them.
- Everything in the institution is geared towards providing transformative education in a structured manner towards students with accessibility, comprehensibility and transparency as our watchwords in this process.

### **Experiential Learning**

Incessant and deliberate efforts are made by the faculty to enable the students to perceive their potentialities and evolve as leaders and metamorphosis as emissaries of change in society. Some of the methods adopted to accomplish this process are:

- Regular exposure to advanced levels of knowledge and skill requirements of the industry through excursions and field trips which keep the students well acquainted with the latest trends.
- Project work bolsters team work and participative learning. Industrial visits, study hours, museum visits, heritage walks and excursions are undertaken on a regular basis to provide practical and hands on experience to the students.
- Practical exposure by Science Department bolsters experiential and participative learning for the students is promoted.

### **Participative Learning**

- The student council helps to share students' ideas, interest and concerns with teachers and the college principal. Students get a chance to participate in college governance through representation in Student Council.
- Activities like group discussions seminars, quiz contest, debate declamations, extension lectures, and workshops create an environment of participative learning.
- Extensive use of case study is made to ameliorate the problem solving ability of the students.

### **Problem Solving Methodologies**

- Career Counselling and Guidance cell in the college helps in enhancing the quality and skillful education of students and endeavors to give the students full exposure and make them well equipped to meet the demands of the competitive job market.
- The college conducts UGC/ CSIR -NET classes for the post graduate students of the Departments of Economics, English and Commerce. Equal Opportunity Cell, Women Sexual Harassment Committee, Anti–Ragging Cell and Red Ribbon Club of the college secure furtherance of equality among all the students.
- Exclusive attention is paid to the slow learners to resolve their issues.

### Use of ICT enabled tools for effective Learning

- In this era of digitalization the teachers of the institution have embraced the use of ICT tools to enhance the quality of teaching learning process. Since the beginning of the pandemic teachers have taken classes through the Google meet platform. The use of ICT tools by the faculty has enabled better and swifter communication and delivery of curriculum in an effective way.

## **2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**

#### 2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

#### **Response:**

- Updating of University notifications about the examination is provided to teachers as well as students.
- Continuous information regarding evaluation on the basis of house examination/ monthly tests, attendance, projects, presentation, departmental lectures and model making is provided to the students.
- The internal assessment is marked twice in every academic session before the commencement of final semester examination.
- The faculty also gives due weightage to the students' participation in sports and extracurricular activities.

#### Transparency in internal assessment mechanism

- At the initiation of the academic session the students are acquainted with the assessment criteria. Students are regularly instructed to attend classes, appear for MSTs and submit assignments.
- The evaluated worksheets are given to the students in classes for on the spot discussion of the performance. The teachers also give them tips to attempt the paper in a more effective manner.
- Every student is required to attend minimum 75% lectures delivered to that class in each paper as well as 75% of the laboratory works, seminars etc.
- The students and parents are duly informed about the attendance and examination awards. It is done with the view that parents can ensure better learning outcomes with the cooperation of teachers.

#### **External Assessment of the students**

- Before the start of the University Theory Examination, Practical Examination is undertaken by the university and the External Examiner is appointed to the respective colleges by the university itself. The External Examiner evaluates the students according to their performance and this is an unbiased evaluation.
- The Examination Registrar appointed by the Principal monitors the whole process of both Internal and External Examination diligently.

#### Mechanism to deal with Grievances of Internal/External Examination

Mid semester tests are conducted in both odd and even semester. The final examinations are conducted at the end of these semesters as per the date sheet released by the University.

Armed with a potent mechanism for redressal of the grievances of the students regarding any problem concerned with internal examination, the Office of the Controller of Examination of the college ensures that the process of handling examination related grievances is crystalline, time bound and efficacious.

The office of the Controller of Examinations of the college maintains record of the internal assessment of the students. The Assessment record of the students is shared and their queries for the same are duly satisfied and answered. There is a moderation committee at the college level that looks into any discrepancy in Internal Assessment marks and takes requisite steps to ensure transparency and objectivity.

For grievances related to University Examination forms, roll numbers, students can contact the Nodal Officer for examinations in college. The Nodal Officer coordinates with the designated person in the administrative office and requests him/ her to rectify the matter with the university. If a student is wrongly marked absent in the final result declared by the University and result of the candidate is withheld, the student can approach examination branch of the college and forward his/her her grievance to the Controller of Examination. The university provides a window of 15 days for redressal of result related grievances (revaluation) .The University has also given the provision of getting a copy of the answer sheet.

- The programme outcomes and course outcomes adopted for all programmes offered by the college are in accordance with the curriculum issued by Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar .These have been put on the home page of the official website of the college. Along with outcomes for each program and course, other associated information has also been displayed on the website .This includes aims of the program taught, qualifications of graduates in the program and the semester-wise distribution of courses.
- Learning outcomes based curriculum framework is envisioned to provide a focused, outcome based syllabus. - In general, teachers study these outcomes closely in order to incorporate them into the teaching learning process. Students are made aware of the program and course specific outcomes through orientation programs are conducted for first year students when they join classes particularly at the beginning of each semester.
- The program and course outcomes are uploaded on the college website to make the students aware. The students after reading these outcomes can visualise what they will be able to do and achieve at the end of the programme.
- Successful alumni are also invited to interact with both students and teachers where they share how the course opted by them shaped their career thus helping present students to understand and relate better with the slated course outcomes.

#### **Response:**

- The college regularly evaluates the performance of students through various methods and seeks to understand the degree for which students attain program outcomes and course outcomes.
- The first way of assessing outcomes is through students responses to discussions and questions generated by teachers in the classrooms. The spontaneity and accuracy of students' answers are an effective and swift way to gauge whether they are observing the course well and in line with suggested outcomes. Class discussions inform teachers about students' attainment of outcomes such as the ability to connect theory with personal experiences, competencies to articulate and communicate ideas, capacity to tolerate vagueness and to critically analyse conflicting theories.
- Another way of assessing these outcomes is by analysing the quality of students' performance in assignments and practical files submitted by them and the grades they receive .The content of the assignment helps the teacher once again to understand if the comprehension demonstrated by students is in accordance to the program and codes outcomes .Gaps in the students' knowledge are then addressed in the classroom by the concerned teacher.
- A potent way to gauge out comes in the end of semester is examination result .Given that students' performance in these exams is based on grades given by the teachers from colleges other than the one in which they study, the results are also indicative of whether neutral assessors can sense the substance and incredibility of the students' work.
- A critical way of assessing the outcomes is the number of students successfully placed in jobs in each academic year.
- The data of the marks obtained by the students in final exams is analysed to calculate the past percentage and compare the result with the university pass percentage. The marks obtained by students in the MSTs, class assignments etc form the basis for internal assessment
- The learning outcomes of the meritorious students can be assessed from the rank of the students who are placed on the University merit list.
- Achievers are felicitated on Annual Prize Distribution function in categories such as- All Round Best Student of the Year, Meritorious students of the various streams, Roll of Honour for Academics and College for outstanding achievements in extra curricular activities.

#### **Feedback Evaluation:**

- The feedback taken from Student and parents is another important method of measuring attainment level of students in terms of program and course outcome as well as to understand the impact of teaching learning process.
- The faculty is also required to mention the past percentage of the respective classes in their Annual Confidential Reports. The results are discussed in the respective department meetings to formulate appropriate Strategies for better performance of the students. Reasons for under performance of students are identified and appropriate remedial measures are suggested.
- Placement, students progression and alumni as indirect measures.
- Number of students placed on campus and off Campus is an indirect measure of the course

program outcome. Student progression is another indicator of program/ course outcome.

- Students are encouraged to pursue studies both in India and abroad. While some choose to remain in discipline-centred, courses others choose specialized or professional courses.
- The alumni of the college occupying prestigious positions stand testimony to the achievement of course/ program outcome.

#### **Response:**

#### **Physical Facilities**

The college has a facilitative environment having adequate infrastructure and physical facilities to promote intellectual growth and scholastic pursuits. The campus covers an area of 33 acres (7408.17 square meters). The college is committed to offer resourceful infrastructure for holistic growth of students. This helps to ensure physical as well as mental growth of the students and also instils the spirit of competition, cooperation, sportsmanship and teamwork among them.

#### **Block Division**

The institution is divided into five major blocks that are, Science Block, Library Building, U shaped Block, Commerce Block and New Block which are well connected through ramps and handrails to facilitate differently abled students and staff. Campus also includes Common room for students, lounge areas and separate canteens for Boys & Girls, lush green gardens, scooter and parking lot. The Administration Block of the institution consists of the Principal's office, the Accounts office, General office, Common Staff Room and Computer Lab.

#### Classrooms

For conducting effective delivery of its curriculum the college has 37 spacious classrooms including 16 ICT enabled smart classrooms, 2 Seminar Halls with AC facility and LCD projector, 3 Computer Labs, 2 Home Science Labs, 2 Music labs and 4 ICT enabled Science Laboratories.

#### Laboratories

The college comprises laboratories in the departments of Computer Science, Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology, Home Science, Music and Functional English, fully equipped with lab instruments and ICT tools. The zoology lab of the college also includes a museum.

#### **College Library**

The well-stocked college library that contains 36,693 books on various subjects such as Humanities,

Science, Commerce, Computer Science, Social Sciences, Languages, Literature, General Knowledge and other related areas. Its impressive infrastructure comprises two reading room for students and staff maintained with E-Granthalaya software version 3.0, a book bank area, Librarian's room and a circulation counter.

#### **Computer Facilities**

There are 69 computers in the college to facilitate e-learning including 12 printers, 3 scanners and Wi-Fi facilities with 100 Mbps bandwidth. The surveillance of the campus is observed with 32 CCTV cameras installed at specific points.

#### **Facilities for Sports**

The institution's sports and games facilities are utilised for university Zonal matches, inter-college sports contests and various other institutional matches in which our students extend overwhelming participation. The outdoor sports facilities include Basketball Ground, Cricket Pitch and a large 400 meter playground for athletic events. The students of the college take part in various competitions at the District Level, State Level and University Level bringing rich laurels to the college. The sports events in which students participate are Freestyle Wrestling, Athletics, Cricket, Karate and Taekwondo. The indoor facility includes a well-equipped gymnasium comprising latest machines. Yoga and meditation are conducted in specific ways at college gymnasium and open ground that strengthen their minds.

#### **Facilities for cultural activities**

The institution actively engages the students through participation in various Inter College Competitions, Zonal and Inter Zonal Youth Festivals and Heritage Festivals. The college students take part in such competitions enthusiastically and perform excellently. Well-acclaimed professionals and experts are invited to help students prepare for the competitions. The students take part in such events as; Fine arts, Music Vocal and Instrumental, Theatre Items and Literary events and perform very well. ## 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

### 4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

- College library simulates the students to obtain, evaluate and recognise knowledge and to familiarised themselves with the trends of knowledge for further education and learning new disciplines. The main objective of an academic library's selection policy is to provide the college community with a wide range of scholarly materials that are consistent with the institution's mission, curricula/research needs, and academic freedom tenets. It offers the resources and encourages the thinking process, creativity, inquisitiveness and makes the learning more fruitful.
- Recognising the value of a well- equipped library for the growth of students and thereby of the institution, "S. Sochet Singh Aujla Library" of the college is one of the richest libraries in the region, having 36693 books on various subjects covering streams like Humanities, Science, Commerce, Computer Science, Social Sciences, Languages, Literature, General Knowledge and Competitive Exams many of which are rare.
- The library also comprises 75 academic and non-academic periodicals 03 Reviews, 09 Competitive Exam Chronicles and various Catalogues. The striking feature of Library are AC reading hall for students and staff, Wi-Fi facility, a book bank area, librarian's room and circulation counter. The availability of physical infrastructure requirements are met with, whenever a new course is introduced or a curriculum need arises.
- The college library's books are uploaded on KOHA software, the world's first free, very useful and advanced open source Integrated Library management system. It's available in the form of an app for android users. On this app anyone can not only search a library's catalogue from

anywhere, but can login into the library account and manage one's borrowings, check due dates etc.

- As a new venture, our institution has registered for N-LIST programme, which is funded by MoE, as a college component under the e- ShodhSindhu Consortium, which would provide access to more than 6000+ e-journals, 1,99,500+ e-books through N-LIST and 6,00,000 e-books through NDL.
- At the beginning of the every session, HOD's of various departments in consultation with the staff members, prepare lists of books and journals required for their respective departments. These requirements are subsequently approved by the Principal and sent to the Library for purchase of the same.
- A Digital Library is a network that allows students to access information from anywhere, at any time. Knowledge of large number of free digital libraries is provided to students in the form of links displayed in the library on the charts. Such an endeavour, offers a wealth of a knowledge resources without any cost, in the students and boosting their academic performance, thus expanding students' horizons in learning. Cloud storage has proved to be a boon indeed. The students with limited budget who can not afford the cost of subscription, get benefitted
- The students and staff of the college have a regular library visit. As our college is a Government body, most of the students are from rural areas and from weaker sections of society, so their need for syllabus related books is fulfilled by the library.
- The library advisory committee of the college, headed by the principal assesses and recommends measures to be taken for the enrichment and upkeep of the library regularly.
- The library staff is student-friendly and is accessible to facilitate the issue and return of books for the students and faculty.

#### **Response:**

To meet the growing demands of technically skilled professionals in the modern competitive world, the college ensures that its students and faculty are facilitated with latest computers and software. The college constantly upgrades its IT facilities including Network, Internet and Wi-Fi in order to ensure an effective teaching-learning process.

#### Hardware Infrastructure

- The college has 3 computer labs along with 69 Computers. The third computer lab was inaugurated in July 2021, in which 15 computers donated by Mr. Ajayveer Singh Sehgal got installed.
- 03 Scanners, 12 Printers and 19 ICT enabled Smart Class Rooms comprising of 10 Touchscreen Boards and 03 Photostat Machines are also available in the campus.
- 32 CCTV cameras have been installed at specific points in the college campus for round the clock surveillance.
- The institution provides access to desktop systems for both students and faculty allowing them to use computer aid for academic projects, practical sessions and for learning.
- Teachers make use of various types of teaching methods to elevate the process of teaching in an easier way. Teaching aids can even make difficult subjects look easier. Apart from using only textbooks, the usage of various aids can make the students more interested in learning. The faculty uses Audio visual aids for the better understanding of the topic. These aids play a vital role in the retention of the topic matter and save energy and time of both the faculty and students. There are Smart Boards installed in some of the classrooms, used by the faculty members in an effective manner.
- In the current Academic Session 2022-23 the institution has purchased 3 Interactive Panels which boosted up the teaching learning process. These panels help teachers play a significant role as mentors towards building future leaders. These are installed in the rooms no 30, 103 and 104 and these have enhanced the teaching process.

#### Software Infrastructure

- All the computers in the college are supported by internet bandwidth of 100 Mbps which is indeed a seamless internet facility.
- The softwares used in the IT facilities of college are MS-Office 2007 and 2010, MS Front page 2003, Turbo C & C++ (3.2), Oracle log, Coral draw 12, Adobe Photoshop (7.0), Python, and SPSS 16.
- The college provides all standard computational and specific typesetting packages such as Oracle, Java, PHP, Python etc. that are database management system languages used for coding.
- Office automation packages like Open Office, MS Office are used and updated regularly.
- A backup is taken for all the systems and windows and antivirus are updated on a regular basis. LAN and Network connections are also monitored by the IT consultant.
- The college website is regularly maintained and upgraded.
- The IT facility also provides a platform to the students for accessing library books through KOHA app and they can check new arrivals in the library, due dates to return their books and many such benefits.
- As a new venture, our institution has registered for N-LIST programme, which is funded by MoE, as a college component under the e- ShodhSindhu Consortium,.
- To make learning process more effective various innovative methods are used by the teachers. This includes giving group assignments and having power point presentations, where students can discuss and explore their knowledge collectively. Learning combined with visual presentations proves fruitful.

6.2.1

- Directorate of Public Instructions, Colleges (Punjab) is an attached department that performs a coordinating role between secretariat and Colleges of State, augmenting matters relating to policy formulation, administrative affairs, and financial matters. So, the institution is administrated and conducted by rules and regulations laid down by D.P.I., Colleges.
- At the institutional level, controlling authority at the top of hierarchy i.e. the Principal, assisted by the statutory bodies lays down a framework set up as per the norms of UGC and NAAC.
- The mandatory committees like IQAC, Staff council, PTA, Alumni etc. are functional in consultation with the Principal, setting up regular meetings and maintaining minutes to ensure practice of democratic principles, teamwork and culture of excellence.
- Staff Council with Senior Faculty Members, HODs of 20 Academic Departments, under the stewardship of the Principal, look after academic domains pertaining to division of syllabi, academic planner, timetable allocation, co-curricular activities, seminars, workshops, conduction

of mid semester examinations and other related ventures.

- The institution being affiliated to GNDU (Amritsar), follows the Academic Calendar set forth by the university viz-a-viz curricula, examination, evaluation, vacations and cultural youth events.
- Extension and Outreach Programmes like NCC, NSS, Red Cross Society, Red Ribbon Club and Legal Literacy Club work towards orienting students to community services.
- Career Counselling and Guidance Cell and Students Welfare Committee work for professional development of students while Anti- Ragging Cell, Women Sexual Harassment Committee and Disability Redressal Cell, ensure no violation of rules within the campus and diligently work to address the related issues.
- Students' Council is a strong support mechanism to the faculty to promote the interests and raise a curtain on the problems encountered at student level.
- The Administrative Office of the College, comprising of the three sections- Establishment, Examination and Accounts, ensures seamless co-ordination between the colleges and the regulatory bodies.
- Non-Teaching Staff that includes , Senior and Junior Lecture Assistants, Lab Attendants and Class IV- employees ensure coherent and harmonious co-ordination with the students and the teaching bodies.
- The Permanent Staff is given its salary pertinent to the Pay Commission accepted by Government of Punjab. Guest Faculty Staff Salary is jointly allocated by DPI Colleges as well as from PTA fund of the institution. The Staff indulged in teaching of Self Finance Courses are paid from a separate SFS Fund.
- Permanent Teaching Staff is appointed by Punjab Public Service Commission while vacant nonteaching and supporting staff positions are filled at the college level as per the guidelines of DPI Colleges, Government of Punjab. Promotional policies and Grade enhancement are set up on par with the regulation of the Government.
- After the retirement, which is fixed, to be at the age of 58 years, the permanent staff is entitled to a retirement gratuity, fixed leave encashment and the amount that employee has contributed to his/her Provident Fund throughout the Service.

#### **Performance Appraisal of Teaching Staff**

- The institute follows a well planned appraisal system for both teaching and non-teaching faculty, structured by the Government itself. Appraisal is prominently done on the basis of feedback received on the students' feedback forms. This provides an insight into one's own assessment of effectiveness of the teaching style and it's impact on the students. It also reflects the involvement of both teaching and non-teaching activities. Feedback forms are a showcase of a teacher's professional competence.
- The College has adopted "Performance Based Appraisal System" prescribed by UGC. Faculty performance is verified, validated and sent to the DPI colleges in the form of annual ACRs. The performance evaluation is done on the parameters like teaching and evaluation activities, extension activities, paper publications, seminars and conferences attended etc. The performance of contractual, part time and guest faculty staff is diligently monitored by the principal and HODs.
- Before the execution of a lecture, each staff member is required to be equipped with his/ her lesson plan. Prior to the commencement of the semester, teaching staff ensures to formulate an academic plan regarding the distribution of the syllabi fixed for the course being taught. The service books of permanent staff are updated time to time as per the requirement of DPI (colleges). The report of staff working against the vacant posts is also sent to the DPI office.
- Feedback procedure of the teachers, taken from the students, as instructed by IQAC is carried out by providing feedback forms to the students, which have a set questionnaire. The questions are structured to elicit response regarding the parameters like communication skills, subject

knowledge, discipline, work-ethics, curricula, effective mentoring, career counselling and magnificent mentor mentee attitude. This paves way to enhance teacher's ability in creating an interactive, discussion-oriented and democratic classroom which can be graded as academically excellent.

#### Performance Appraisal of Non teaching Staff

- The non teaching staff members put forward their self appraisal forms to their respective HOD's. The reviewing officer accords points to the concerned employee on the scale of 10 after a vigilant insight into self appraisal report filled. A constructive feedback is given to the employees so that they can further enhance their performance level and efficiency.
- Also the performance of the faculty both teaching and non teaching is verified and validated upon the set parameters such as teaching - learning evaluation, professional development, co-curricular and extension activities and their research and academic contribution. Faculty members are encouraged to attend FDPs, various Academic Courses, Conferences, Orientations, Workshops and Seminars to upgrade their skills and knowledge.
- As per the procedures outlined by the IQAC, the feedback forms are provided available online as Google forms and teacher-in-charge ensure that the students of the respective departments compulsorily fill the feedback questionnaire regarding permanent and temporary teaching staff.

## 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

#### 6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

- The Institution prepares a centralised Annual Budgetary plan in the beginning of the session that is thoroughly discussed and presented in IQAC meetings for timely salary payments, maintenance work required for college building, maintenance of the teaching aids, other teaching material and laboratory equipments. Regular External Financial Audit is done over the funds received through various agencies.
- The major sources of institutional financial resources are PTA fund, fee from students for regular and self financed courses, college canteen; RUSA, Equity and UGC grants and Old Students Association (OSA).
- PTA fund received from students is used for development of the college as well as for partial salary payment of guest faculty staff. The Institution also receives partial salary grant from DPI colleges, Punjab for Guest faculty posts and their record is maintained throughout the session. Library and Sports services are strengthened, laboratories are augmented and IT facilities are increased for better academic environment. The Institution maintains a Wi-Fi equipped campus for its staff members which enables them to use IT tools.
- The college caters to the rural, financially weaker sections of students in terms of scholarships. Government scholarships and projects enhance college resources. Incharge of Scholarship Committee keeps record of the scholarship of the students.
- Various educational funds from the Alumni, well-wishers of the college and corporates further strengthen the institution resources. The contribution of Alumni Association is allocated by Principal.
- The financial resources are also utilized for providing staff's need based financial assistance, purchase of library books, journals, laboratory equipments, modern teaching aids etc. Students are

also catered with canteen facility, safe drinking water, recreation rooms, common rooms, parks and play grounds.

- The institution conducts both internal and external audit regularly to ensure total transparency in financial matters. The Punjab Government's financial rules are properly implemented in financial transactions of the institution.
- Internal sources of finance include fees and funds from student PTA fund, fund and from self finance courses and donations. It's a continuous process which ensues after each and every financial transaction and the college itself carries out the initial stage of the internal audit. The officer incharge scrutinizes and verifies the financial data.
- The institution receives external funds from various sources such as UGC, guest faculty funds for their salary, scholarship funds for students, RUSA equity grant etc. During last five financial years number of grants have been received from RUSA, under infrastructure component and equity component. These grants have been used for the developmental and maintenance aspects of institute The bills and vouchers of the revenue expenditure are checked and a proper record is maintained and verified by the authority.
- Utilisation of funds received from various agencies are audited by the auditors appointed by the Government on the completion of ongoing project or grant and then utilization certificate is submitted to the concerned higher authority on regular basis.
- External financial audit is conducted by the Auditor of the Government. The purchase bills that come under internal financial audit are thoroughly checked by college Bursar and quotations are invited from the open market. These bills include expenditure on various institutional events
- The institution has meticulously adopted a transparent system for mobilising funds from different funding agencies. A proper procedure of purchase is also adopted. Quotations are called and prices are compared.

#### 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

#### 6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

#### **Response:**

• The IQAC is a Nodal agency of the Institution comprising the Principal as chairman and senior teachers from various departments that plays a significant role in maintaining and enhancing the quality parameters of the Institution. It systematizes and channelizes quality measures and efforts towards academic excellence. It conducts regular meetings for the institutionalising of quality

assurance strategies and skill development of both the faculty and the students.

- IQAC takes care of the needs of the administrative staff to improve their work atmosphere, both at the professional and emotional fronts. In order to encourage a harmonious work atmosphere amongst the administrative and teaching faculty, seminars on Work Ethics, Stress Management, Soft Skills and Emotional Well-being are conducted on regular basis.
- Various quality initiatives are taken by IQAC like outcome based education, course outcome and their refinement, continuous enrichment of teaching-learning process, feedback from students, parents and faculty, promoting technology enhanced learning, remedial classes for weak students to improve their academics, tutorials and video lectures to enlighten the students. Apart from this, involvement of experts from other reputed organisations are called upon for additional study sessions by organizing guest talks to aid the students in their respective fields and make them competent. IQAC also promotes career counselling activities to efficate the career aspects of the students.
- Teams of teachers are sent to the nearby catchment areas in various Government and private senior secondary schools to increase the enrolment of the students. Under the guidance of Department of Higher Education colleges (Punjab), the College organised "Alumni Meet" of old students of the college, who are working as school teachers in the catchment area. Its aim was to increase enrolment of the students in the institution.
- The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structure and methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through Academic Departments. The IQAC is responsible for developing, co-ordinating and monitoring academic assessment activities to inspire improvement in student learning.
- For improving attendance and results of the students various initiatives are taken such as organizing Parents-Teachers Meetings, feedback from parents, students and alumni, MST and class tests to improve their results. Special remedial classes are arranged for slow learners and advanced and competitive books are provided to the learners to make them more skilled.
- All the Departments are encouraged to organise conferences and seminars on themes relevant to the educational needs and futuristic growth of the students. Such initiatives boost confidence of the learners and make them well competent to face the challenges of real life.
- All the faculty members prepare their lesson plans well in advance before the commencement of class work for the courses. Every faculty member maintains course file for each course being taught. Class review committee meetings are held with students to know the progress of course coverage, pedagogy practices and efficacy of the teaching learning process.
- The ICT tools are well maintained and teachers are encouraged to use these tools regularly. Workshops are organized to familiarize the faculty with the various teaching and communication platforms.
- The institution has switched over to the outcome based programmes by using brainstorming ideas. Course End Feedback and Programme Exit Feedback are collected from the students so as to improve upon the course content, it's delivery mechanism and evaluation system. Alumni feedback has helped in refinement of curriculum.

Gender equity has been the ultimate objective of our organization. Dwindling sex ratio has been a matter of prime concern (943 females for every 1000 males as per 2011 census).

- The college has provided common rooms to girls, both in the hostels as well as in college campus, where they can read, chat or play indoor games at leisure. Entire campus is green with seating benches at fixed places where girls can sit with peers, or with mentors or teachers and discuss and talk at ease.
- The College provides counselling facilities to students of both gender. Special attention is given to female students. Programmes such as, issues faced by young adults, reproductive health, healthy relationships stress management, personality development etc. are conducted every year for all students. Areas like gender sensitivity, eve teasing, physical, verbal and sexual abuse are also discussed during these programmes. All the first-year students in the first semester are individually made to meet the counsellor. The objective of this exercise is to create psychological awareness and the need for counselling in their adolescent life.

#### **Response:**

#### **Best Practice1: Environmental Related Efforts**

Taking cognizance of NEP 2020 and National Biodiversity Targets 2021, the college has embraced practice of environmental sustainability which comprises perpetuation of natural resources and protection of ecosystem. The campus is known for its lush green environment and well- maintained grounds. Within its ambit comes, the creation of green and clean campus with large well maintained lawns, a host of eco -friendly projects, awareness generation programs and an emphasis on sustainability. Massive endeavors have been made by the students and the academia to create awareness about environmental sustainability. Tree Plantation drives are conducted time to time throughout the year sensitising the students pertaining to environmental issues. At present the college flaunts 1022 plant species as its fauna. This has improved the biodiversity index of the campus by attracting many species of birds and insects. This novel initiative amalgamates the tradition by selecting species native to the region and modern Miyawaki technique thereby promoting natural restoration of land.

#### **Botanical Garden**

In order to provide practical knowledge of plants, our college has developed a botanical garden in the college campus. The main purpose of this garden is to inform students about the importance of medicinal plants .This garden also facilitates conservation of rare and endangered herbal plants .It has more than 65

species of economically important medicinal plants. Botanical garden is rich in plant biodiversity. The students learn about the various types of plant varieties like medicinal plants, ornamental plants, herbs, shrubs while enjoying the beauty of botanical garden. The different varieties of grasses, shrubs and trees also help in recharging of groundwater. In the botanical garden mostly those plants are planted which are required for taxonomy studies.

#### **College and Campus Beautification Committee**

This committee Works constantly towards creating awareness and sensitising the staff and students regarding the sustainable environment issues. The committee organises environment awareness drives and holds environment education classes. The students participate in projects of national environment awareness campaigns.

#### Waste management

To handle solid waste along with sustainability has been the prime focus of our college. Separate dustbins have been placed in the campus to collect both degradable and non degradable waste.Collection drives for newspapers and posters are held.Recycling workshops are held to create awareness about plastic waste,food waste and menstrual waste.The college continuously strives to create a zero waste campus by implementing 3 Rs of waste management-Reduce,Reuse and Recycle.

- Vermicomposting pits convert leaf litter into compost through biodegradation.
- There has been complete restriction on single use plastic.
- The waste water generated by ROs and air conditioners is used to water the plants.
- Printer cartridges are refilled and reused
- The college practices rain water harvesting and uses solar energy to combat greenhouse gas emissions, reduce energy bills and preserve the environment for future generation.

#### **Outreach Environmental Activities**

Large number of environmental related activities are undertaken to motivate the students and create social consciousness about environment sustainability by Inter department societies and CNN programmes.

#### **Best Practice2: All round Development of Students**

The goal of an inclusive education system is to provide all students with the most appropriate learning environments and opportunities for them to best achieve their potential. All children can learn and reach their full potential given opportunity, effective teaching and appropriate resources.

It is a new concept covering wide range of areas. It means to educate all the children in the same learning environment which provides personal, academic and professional development of all learners. It leads to a sense of belongingness within the classroom community. It is the process of education which promotes social acceptance, peace and cooperation.

Our institutions tries to develop effective education practices that would lead to transformation change for student learning and achievements. The focus is to develop effective verbal, non-verbal ,written, technological and communication skills to support and enhance student learning.

#### The context

Students get admission in various courses primarily on their on the merit basis but due weightage is also given to the socioeconomic backwardness. The institution complies with the norms of the punjab government with regards to reservation for SC/BC. Institutional procedures are chosen keeping in view that the majority of students belong to socioeconomic backward section so absolute endeavours are made to foment their cognitive ability to revamp into socially functional unit.

#### The Practice

Instruction plans are crafted, based on students'needs, curricular goals and subject matter. The emphasisis laid on the continuous assessment through innovative techniques such as seminars, assignments, current topics, quiz and project work in which maximum student participation is ensured. The institution provides an apt platform for students' all round development. The institute adopts innovative, student centric methods such as experiential learning, participative and problem solving methodologies to enhance learning experiences. The teaching approach is reciprocal not linear. The faculty members also attend various orientation programmes and workshops to hone their teaching skills.

The best efforts are made by the institution to provide financial assistance under government schemes on merit basis. Computer based courses are also part of the curriculum to provide students accessibility to the upcoming dynamic areas of study. These courses are self financed and relatively costlier for those students to afford. They can be made accessible for the weaker sections if obligatory funds are provided.

#### **Evidence of Success**

The achievement of educational inclusion is evident from increase in proportion of students from SC/BC categories in total enrolment in the institution. These students are also part of the merit position holders of the University and actively participate in various co-curricular activities like cultural and sports events . They exhibit valour, discipline ,spirit of adventure and loyalty towards duty in NCC unit. Excellent results in academics in all classes speak volumes of our success in sharpening the intellect of our students. Our students win considerable number of prizes in co-curricular activities in the inter college competitions and youth festivals .Our students succeed in sports arena and bring glory to their alma mater. Our distinguished alumni have become our brand ambassadors in disparate fields.

#### Problems

There are financial constraints in the implementation of the above mentioned goals. Some of the faculty positions as well as non- teaching posts are lying vacant. More seats are required in upcoming job-oriented courses. More vocational courses will ensure influx of students.

Since world is facing unprecedented environmental challenges and pollution crisis, therefore, keeping it in pace with the global focus, the institution too aims to put the ecosystem restoration on a high prioritypedestal and put in all endeavors to recreate and restore it.

- In order to emerge out triumphatic in achieving environment friendly framework, institute encourages the students to embrace green principles, practices and lifestyles in accordance with the 'Green Campus Policy' and 'Plastic Free Campus Policy', available at the website of the college.
- The institute works on the generic guidelines to make campus activities sustainable, as far as possible by keeping a watchful eye on the sectors such as resource optimization, energy management, landscapes, water conservation, transportation, procurement, waste management and event organization.
- With Environmental Studies as a compulsory subject in the curricula of third and fourth semester students, they are taught about environmental consciousness so that they can move towards the direction of global well-being in the field of environment sustainability.
- Our NCC, NSS units and Cultural Activity Wings function efficiently in the direction of Green Environment. Regular Drives of tree plantation are carried out within the campus as well as in the neighbourhood villages persistently. Outreach activities of cleanliness in the campus, in the neighbourhood as well as in the nearby wetlands are carried out throughout the year by NCC and NSS cadets.
- To promote environment sustainability the college has adopted the village Kanjali, district Kapurthala for constructive activities. The NSS volunteers visit the village for outreach programmes and spread awareness about Voting process, Voter Id cards, drugs prevention measures, environment friendly activities etc. The volunteers show robust participation in activities as Tree Plantation, Cleanliness Drives, Blood Donation Camps, Awareness Rallies etc.
- Keeping in pace with the 'Swatch Bharat Mission' NCC and NSS members indulge environment friendly activities such as cleaning of statue of Great persons time to time.
- The college upholds the best practices of environmental sustainability and education inclusion through various Initiatives. Botanical Garden has been developed by amalgamating the traditional and the modern Miyawaki technique thereby promoting natural restoration of land. It is developing into a hub of natural biodiversity and is a step towards reducing the carbon footprints of the region. The college prides itself on its diverse vegetation ranging from humble and commonly found plants and trees species to more exotic and hybrid varieties.
- The college disposes solid and green waste in a responsible manner. Green and Blue bins are separately kept for biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes. Biodegradable waste is used by vermicomposting unit of the college while non-biodegradable waste are sent for recycling
- At present due to access to free digital books from various colleges and universities as well as

purchase of e- journal N-LIST (on 24.02.2023), the institution is advocating the instruction of NEP 2020. Making downloaded versions knowledgeable textbooks and study materials easily available, is definitely a novel green environment venture by the institution

- The college tries to minimise the use of chemical fertilisers and encourages the Plantation of trees that are indigenous, hardy and replenish water and nutrition in the soil. It is developing into hub of natural diversity and is helping to reduce the carbon footprint of the region. It has also ameliorated the biodiversity marker of the area by attracting many species of birds and insects. The students learn to appreciate their natural habitats. The college boasts of its 200 years old veteran people tree which is a landmark and heritage Tree.
- Botanical Garden of the Institution is a collection of trees bearing different canopies, shrubs, herbs and succulents. The college has adopted Green Greeting Culture. Instead of bouquets, guests and resource persons are greeted with the green plants presented in the pots.
- Over the past few years waste management has become a global concern. Waste management does not only save natural resources, biodiversity in human life but it also impacts the economy in a positive way. Proper solid waste collection is important for protection of public health and environmental quality. To handle solid waste along with sustainability has been the prime focus of our college. Separate dustbins have been placed in the campus to collect both degradable and non degradable waste. Collection drives for newspapers and posters are held. Recycling workshops are held to create awareness about plastic waste, food waste and menstrual waste.
- Vermicomposting unit has also been established in the botanical garden. This unit comprises two pits. Fallen tree leaves are collected in the morning along with the yard waste and are deposited in vermicompost pits prepared in botanical garden. These pits are half filled with cow dung, egg shells, vegetables peels and dry leaves to produce good quality, environment friendly manure to be used in college lawns.
- Liquid Waste Management also exists in the institution. Students are continuously sensitised to conserve water for a better tomorrow. Push type faucets have been installed and their proper maintenance is done regularly to check wastage of water .RO reject and waste water generated from air conditioners is used for watering the plants. Sprinklers have been installed in the lawns to reduce water consumption for Irrigation.
- The college campus beautification committee functions towards raising and maintaining planned diversity in the campus green areas. Large botanical garden aids to give practical demonstration to science students. This garden is used as a central nursery for raising horticulture plants that are used to beautify the campus.
- Being government institution, it primarily caters to the needs of students from socially and economically backward sections of society. The aim of the practice to enhance their learning capabilities so that they are better placed in the society.
- Various commemorative days related to environment for celebrated to sensitise the students about the importance of environmental preservation.
- The unique Institutional Distinctiveness of college is imbibed and carried forward by the alumni who are serving the nation at various prestigious positions.
