15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The Institution has a holistic multidisciplinary curriculum with a vision to equip the students with an overall knowledge on allied fields apart from their core subjects. Humanities, Science and Commerce are an integral part of the courses in the Institute. Drug Abuse and Environment Science are taught in first four semesters of the course. Projects on community engagement and social service are undertaken by students every semester. For example, Distribution of necessary accessories to Kushta Ashram and slum areas, blood donation camps, educating women on health and hygiene etc. NSS Volunteers and NCC Cadets take part in community services throughout the year. The faculty of the Institute participate in many interdisciplinary National and International Conferences, Seminars, Orientations, Faculty Development, Programmes etc. every year to promote a blending of different disciplines leading to the exchange of research ideas and knowledge on topics of various domains.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is a virtual/digital storehouse that contains the information of the credits earned by individual students throughout their learning journey. It will enable students to open their accounts and give multiple options for entering and leaving colleges or universities. The Institution is keen to step into 'Academic Bank of Credit' platform created by National e-Governance Division (NeGD) of the Ministry of Electronics and information Technology. But this would be done under the directions of GNDU and approval by Higher Education Department, Punjab. Further the Institute is offering a basket of elective papers for each B.A., B.Sc., M.A. English and Economics, courses and the students have flexibility to choose the subjects as per requirement. This is a preliminary initiative taken by the Institute to fulfill the bigger goal of implementing the Academic bank of credits.

17.Skill development:

The institution organises various events and programmes to foster a sense of teamwork, inventiveness, inquisitiveness, reliability, assertiveness, and sympathy in faculty and students. All of this lays a strong foundation for future academic and career success. The faculty of the institution participate in various FDP's and Seminars to upgrade their knowledge and develop the skills necessary to perform effectively. The college has taken the initiative to conduct

seminars, workshops, and guest lectures to sensitise the students and develop their leadership qualities, communication skills, creativity, professionalism, and so on. Students and teachers alike are encouraged to upscale their skill. This academic year the students have visited various industries to have first-hand knowledge and experience of working and they have attended Extension Lectures by renowned personalities which gave them insight to choose their career wisely. The institution's skill development efforts are evident through its enrichment of curriculum, electives and add-on courses too. Currently two diploma courses recognised by Jagat Guru Nanak Punjab State Open University, Patiala. The College organizes various Model-Making Competitions, Workshops, Quiz, Rangoli, Phulkari, Poster Making, Clay Modelling, Paper Presentation Competitions for the students on a regular basis to encourage Skill Based education. External experts guide the students in the same during Inter College and Zonal Youth Festival Competitions. The soft skill development programme is an integral part of every student's curriculum. Besides English Learning and Teaching Skills, Poetry Recitation, Essay writing competitions, Literary competitions help to enhance their learning. Moral and Ethical values are inculcated among students through different social programmes organized in collaboration with NCC, NSS, Red Ribbon Club and various departmental activities which helps the students to imbibe holistic human values needed for the overall character development of an individual. Sports and Physical activities are also organized for all students to assimilate the values needed to live a peaceful life.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Language, as a medium of communication, is the driving force of worldly affairs. Without language one cannot think of the existence of the world itself. Study of Indian Languages in the present times is extremely vital. It is the need of the hour as the exploration of Indian Knowledge Systems (IKS) has begun. We have started to explore the ancient indigenous knowledge of various scientific fields which are naturally in indigenous languages. So, to support such exploration and research activities knowledge of Indian Languages, its literature, structure and range of knowledge is a prerequisite. Hence, the study of Indian Languages contributes to the greater cause of unearthing the ancient Indian knowledge and converging its outcomes with the modern requirements leading to prosperity of the society and nation at large. Study of indigenous languages not only leads to the prosperity of the nation but also makes the individual person culturally rooted and betters his/her expressiveness. To

promote/ integrate Indian Knowledge System, College is ever conscious. College has included Hindi, English, Punjabi and Sanskrit in its curriculum as Elective Subjects to reach across cultures and religions, thereby promoting true National Spirit in the youth. National and International days related to language like Mother Tongue Day, Hindi Diwas, World Poetry Day etc. are celebrated to promote these languages. The rich literature of these languages inculcate ethical values and rich heritage of our country. In Post Graduate course in English includes a paper Indian Writing in Translation which have four different units of different languages that is Sanskrit, Punjabi, Bengali and Marathi. This learners get to know about different cultures through literature. In the curriculum set by Guru Nanak Dev University thee are religious topics too like Japji Sahib Gurbani by Shri Guru Nanak Dev Ji in Post Graduate English, which indicates the zeal of the Institution to inculcate spiritual, moral and ethical values in the students- that seem diminishing in today's world. Inclusion of 'Nath Bani', 'Bhagat Bani' and 'Gurbani' in Elective Punjabi Syllabus, incorporation of sermons by Shri Guru Nanak Dev Ji, Kabir ji, Surdas ji and Tulsi Das ji in Elective Hindi Syllabus and inculcation of moral and spiritual values from some chapters of Bhagvat Gita in Elective Sanskrit syllabus unfold the richness of ancient scriptures for the students.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome-based education (OBE) offers a framework to learn and deliver the acquired skills, focusing on the end result. It increases students' academic success and decreases dropouts. Hence, the college gives outcome-based education (OBE) to the students and focuses on performance-based learning. This is an attempt to measure educational efficiency using outcomes rather than inputs like the amount of time students spend in class. The college offers an education that is learner-oriented by implementing various teaching techniques and conducting evaluations. OBE focuses more on what students can do with what they have learned than on what they know. This makes it relevant to both students and employers, as it prepares students for the real world and meets the needs of Through the mainstreaming and integration of vocational businesses. education into general education, which will assist students in developing a variety of skills to meet industry demands and enhance the quality of education, the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 has placed a special emphasis on vocational education. The new policy has created a skill-based education model. Following are some leaning outcomes: Students are able to see themselves as individuals with various abilities and skills, of which some are more developed than others. They demonstrate regular involvement and active

engagement over a period of time. They are able to identify and demonstrate their understanding of global issues, make responsible decisions, and take appropriate action in response to the issue either locally, nationally or internationally.

20.Distance education/online education:

Online teaching and learning make students more responsible for their own education. ICT helps students get ready by letting them explore, assess, share, and present information in a fairly organised way. Modern learners are good with technology, so using ICT in their everyday learning makes them feel and look good. 2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

The college has adopted a student centric approach aiming to transform students from the role of passive recipients to active stakeholders. This approach also boosts their confidence but a teacher centric class cannot deliver a uniform learning outcome. The teacher facilitates learning by allowing every student to grasp and learn at personal level by ensuring their full involvement in class activities. The students are provided with a detailed understanding of the specific objects of a course through orientation programs to help them understand the primary focus of the course. Consequently the students are able to self-evaluate their performance at the end of their course.

Participative learning motivates innovative thought and offbeat expositions. Field work, audio-visual methodology, industrial visits and projects are different means of experiential and participative learning. Students are asked to submit written assignments while searching on the given topic to bolster their confidence and hone their writing skills.

Seminars encourage the students to present assignments independently and they also help them to chisel their skill of oration.

Debates and discussions on current topics chisel reflective and analytical skills of the students and prepare them for life. Participation in NSS and NCC programmes aid the students to integrate and learn.

In the session 2022-23 total 7 industrial visits and 9 Extension Lectures have been organized by Career Counseling and Guidance Cell to give the students a firsthand experience of industrial manufacturing work and learning methods from various perspectives of resource persons.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Set up on a sprawling 33 acres campus with covered area of 74 08.17 square meters, the magnificent red and white building of Nawab Jassa Singh Ahluwalia Government College bears the royal insignia comprising adequate, state-of-the-art physical infrastructure facilities for enabling an effective teachinglearning process for its faculty and students. The institute constantly upgrades itself with current trends in educational infrastructure to meet the needs of the times, while maintaining the statutory requirements of regulatory body UGC. The college building comprises total 34 class rooms, 3 Conference cum Seminar halls and 8 well-equipped laboratories fully equipped with lab instruments and ICT tools. The zoology lab of the college also includes a museum.

The magnificent and aesthetically designed building of the college comprises four blocks: U Block, New Block, Commerce Block and Science Block and is the best for facilitating the teachinglearning process. At present 20 ICT enabled smart classrooms well equipped with Wi-Fi facility and 5 rooms in which interactive panels have been installed are available. Wi-Fi facility along with 79 computers and 7 printers cum scanners are also available in the campus along with Botanical Garden, Ground, OSA Park and other small parks.

The college library, the biggest treasure of knowledge has one of the oldest book banks. It is well equipped with AC reading room for students and more than 38,000 books to upgrade their knowledge. It gives access to scholarly journals, databases and other resources for academic inquiry and intellectual exploration.

Noteworthy features include an air-conditioned reading hall for students and staff, Wi-Fi facility, a book bank area, librarian's room, and a circulation counter

To enhance accessibility, the college library's books are cataloged using KOHA software, the world's first free, highly useful, and advanced open-source Integrated Library Management System. As part of a new initiative, our institution has enrolled in the N-LIST program, funded by the Ministry of Education (MoE), as a college component under the e-ShodhSindhu Consortium.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

To address the increasing demand for technically skilled professionals in today's competitive world, the college ensures that both its students and faculty have access to the latest computers and software. Continuous upgrades to IT facilities, including the network, internet, and Wi-Fi, are undertaken to facilitate an effective teaching-learning process.

Hardware Infrastructure:

The college boasts three computer labs with a total of 50 computers. Additionally, there are 3 scanners, 7 scanners cum printers, and 20 ICT-enabled smart classrooms featuring 11 touchscreen boards and 3 Photostat machines. A comprehensive network of 32 CCTV cameras ensures round-the-clock surveillance on specific points across the campus.

Access to desktop systems is provided for both students and faculty, allowing them to utilize computer aid for academic projects, practical sessions, and learning.

Software Infrastructure:

All computers in the college benefit from a seamless internet facility with a bandwidth of 100 Mbps. Software used include MS-Office 2007 and 2010, MS Front Page 2003, Turbo C & C++ (3.2), Oracle log, Coral Draw 12, Adobe Photoshop (7.0), Python, and SPSS 16. The college provides standard computational and typesetting packages such as Oracle, Java, PHP, and Python for coding, along with regular updates for office automation packages like Open Office and MS Office.

Regular backups, updates of Windows and antivirus software, and monitoring of LAN and network connections by an IT consultant ensure a secure and efficient IT environment. The college website is consistently maintained and upgraded.

In the entire Academic and administrative operations, the institution encourages and employs decentralization. 6.2.2 - The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

The institution's executive committee and governing body are both led by the chairperson. The Vice principal, Secretary and other College committee members are a part of decision making bodies.

College follows service rules, conduct rules and procedure under DPI Colleges, UGC and GNDU Amritsar. The principal, Staff Council, and IQAC supervise the academic departments, cells/ committee and offices. All the academic departments are overseen by respective HODs through allocation of time table, discussion of departmental activities/ seminars/ workshops /division of syllabi / planner for cultural and literary activities.

6.3.5 - Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non- teaching staff

For both teaching and non-teaching staff, the college strictly complies with the UGC regulations on minimum qualifications for Appointment of teachers and other academic staff. The institute follows a well-planned appraisal system for the faculty teaching

and non- teaching structured by the government itself. Appraisal is prominently done on the basis of feedback received from the students as well as forms filled by the faculty. The faculty fills up a self-appraisal form as per UGC guidelines at the beginning of the session and submits it to the coordinator IQAC. The appointment of the staff members as contractual, part time and guest faculty is done according to the norms of DPI (colleges). The performance of contractual, part time and guest faculty staff is diligently monitored by the principal and HODs. Before the execution of a lecture, each staff member is equipped with his/ her lesson plan. Regular class tests are conducted to evaluate students' performance. The service book of permanent faculty is updated from time to time as per the requirement of DPI (colleges). Also he performance of the faculty both teaching and non-teaching faculty is verified and validated upon the set parameters such as teachinglearning evaluation, professional development, co-curricular and extension activities and their research and academic contribution. Annual performance reviews and confidential reports are used to evaluate both teaching and non teaching staff's character and habits, departmental abilities, hard work capacity, discipline, reliability, and technical abilities. All employees receive promotions and pay upgrades based on satisfactory performance.

6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly Enumerate the various internal and external financial audits carried out during the year with the mechanism for settling audit objections within a maximum of 200 words

The Institution periodically performs internal and external financial audits. The Punjab Government's financial rules are properly implemented in financial transactions of the institution.

Annual financial statements are prepared and presented for audit at the conclusion of each fiscal year. The financial statements, paperwork, receipts, and bills are examined by the auditors. The statutory payments, such as TDS, Professional Tax, PF, and remittance, are examined. The auditors also verify the receipt of fees and the distribution of scholarships awarded by the government and other organizations. All financial transactions are examined by the auditors, who also provide a thorough report on their findings. The college's accountant makes the necessary changes to the statements of accounts based on the observations provided.

In the internal financial audit purchase bills are thoroughly checked by college bursar and quotations are invited from various stakeholders. These bills include expenditure on various events of Youth Festival, honorarium to the experts or resource persons invited for various extension lectures, expenditure on college property and on science department practical and lab equipment etc. Internal sources of finance include fees and funds from student PTA fund, fund from self-finance courses and donations. The institution receives external funds from various sources such as UGC, guest faculty funds for their salary, scholarship funds for students, RUSA equity grant etc. This financial year grants have been received from Rashtriya Uchchtar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) under infrastructure component and equity component. These grants have been used for the developmental aspects of institute.

6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

The Institute upholds and adheres to a carefully thought-out approach for the mobilization of finances and resources. The primary source of income for the institute in terms of mobilization of Funds is student fees. Alumni support the institute by raising money for construction, teaching, and learning initiatives. For cultural events, both private and corporate sponsorships are sought.

For the procurement of equipment, computers, books, etc., the buying committee requests price quotes from suppliers. Before making a final choice based on the parameters provided, the finance committee carefully examines the quotes. In the event that the expenditure goes over budget, management assistance is requested.

In the IQAC meetings timely salary payments, maintenance work for college building, maintenance of the teaching aids other teaching material and laboratory equipment are discussed. The major sources of institutional financial resources are PTA fund, partial salary grant for Guest Faculty from DPI colleges, fee from students for regular and self-financed courses, college canteen; RUSA, Equity and UGC grants and Old Students Association (OSA). In charge of Scholarship Committee keeps record of scholarship of the students. The contribution of Alumni Association called OSA, to the college is mobilized by the Secretary.

The appointment of sufficient and qualified lab workers and system administrators ensures the best possible use of resources and infrastructure and it is made possible by promoting creative teaching-learning methods. The physical facilities are best used for remedial classes, co-curricular and extracurricular events, and parent-teacher conferences outside of regular college hours.

The planning, carrying out, and evaluation of each of the tasks related to teaching learning process in the institution are crucially influenced by the IQAC. IQAC takes care of the needs of the administrative staff to improve their work atmosphere, both at the professional and emotional fronts.

The most crucial duty of the IQAC is to prepare the AQAR. The entire team ensures that the report is efficiently created and delivered on time. It is posted online on the institution website after receiving NAAC approval.

The IQAC monitors the instructional- learning process of the institution. The faculties are urged to use ICT-enabled tools and other instructional techniques when instructing students in a classroom. The IQAC makes significant recommendations for the improvement of staff and student infrastructure amenities. As a result, the institution has more reading space this year. The faculties are expected to present papers at seminars, conferences, workshops, faculty development programmes, etc.

Career counseling activities have been strengthened in the college. A total number of 7 Industrial Visits and 10 Extension Lectures have been organized by Career Counseling and Guidance Cell during the session 2022-23 for students' participative and experiential learning. The grants received from RUSA have been used wisely for the constructional changes of the institute and for library books, lab instruments and furniture. The Annual Sports Meet, Annual Prize Distribution function and Convocation ceremony have been held in the college premises during the year.

6.5.2 - The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms and recorded the incremental improvement in various activities

The IQAC regularly evaluates the teaching-learning process and takes action to raise its quality. All newly admitted students are required to attend the mandatory orientation programme, where they learn about the distinctiveness of the educational system, the teaching and learning process, the continuous evaluation system, the required core courses, various co-curricular activities, discipline, and institute culture. During the session 2022-23 the students attended the orientation lecture that enabled them to learn about all the disciplines they could get benefit from. To accomplish the academic goals the faculty is encouraged to attend Refresher Courses, Orientation, Faculty Development Programs and Seminars. Various lectures and seminars are organized in the college itself.

The learning outcomes are duly checked by the examination committee and results of both MST and university are compiled for the assessment of various departments. Before the start of the semester, students are informed of the timetable, programme structure, and course syllabi. Members of the discipline committee conduct sporadic inspections to guarantee that lessons run smoothly. Students participate in class committees on a regular basis to gather input and to help improve the teaching learning process.

The IQAC is responsible for developing, coordinating and monitoring academic assessment activities to inspire improvement in student learning. Based on the IQAC's recommendations, the teaching-learning processes are examined, and changes are made.

The institution prioritizes waste reduction and recycling to minimize the consumption of natural resources. Solid waste, including paper, plastics, glass, metals, and food, is diligently segregated and managed at every level. A designated vendor collects, segregates, recycles, and disposes off the waste in government-approved landfills.

Efforts to reduce plastic waste involve enforcing the use of paper plates, cups, and alternatives. Awareness events and collection bins contribute to responsible plastic disposal, which is compacted and sent to nearby collection agencies for recycling.

In terms of liquid waste management, the college utilizes a welldesigned drainage system. The reverse osmosis (RO) unit produces 40% purified water and 60% wastewater, with the latter collected in Syntax tanks for toilet reuse. Other liquid waste is directed to the drainage system.

Biomedical waste generated is minimal, and the institution has implemented effective strategies for e-waste management, including donation, repurposing for student training, exchanging with electronic companies, and recycling batteries through a dedicated recycler. These initiatives collectively reflect the institution's commitment to environmental sustainability.
